## Major New project for 2000 Access for All

This is an exciting time for the Nature Reserve as plans are afoot to address a number of key issues relating to the conservation and amenity value of the site. The proposed works have been pulled together by council staff to create a co-ordinated project which should attract a significant amount of grant funding. The main features of the project are: *Improved access*.

- Paths will be improved for use with wheelchair, pushchair and for visitors with mobility problems.
   A new stretch of path will be created to provide a circular trail. The material used will be in keeping with the rural nature of the site.
- The existing boardwalk will be replaced with another of improved design.

- Physical barriers, including gate and stiles will be removed or improved to allow easy access to the reserve whilst still protecting against fly- tipping, entry by vehicles and the like.
- The two sets of steps on the Reserve will be improved for use by less mobile visitors.
- Rustic benches will be provided at suitable points along the paths for visitors to sit and enjoy the Reserve.
- A fence will be constructed alongside the ditch, where it emerges from underground, with gates to allow access for maintenance.

More information:

 An information sign will be provided at the main entrance off Eastfield Road to show visitors a map with the trails, main features and wildlife of the Reserve. There will also be a notice board for your Society to advertise events, etc.

Habitat restoration:

 An old, silted up, pond will be excavated to provide an additional pond for wildlife.
 There will also be a bench situated by this pond.

It seems clear to me that the Reserve is already enjoyed by many people who I have met whilst walking its paths. This project is designed to make everyone's visit to the Reserve more safe and enjoyable without changing its wonderful appeal. It is planned that all the works are completed by the end of this year.

Work Party Programme. March - August 2000

March 31st. NEST BOXES: we will be putting up boxes around the Reserve that should house a variety of birds and bats.

April 28th. 'SPRING CLEAN': A good time to enjoy a walk around the Reserve and pick up litter as we go! Gloves, litter pickers and sacks provided!

May 26th. A LOOK AT WILD FLOWERS: A chance to carry out a survey and learn about the great variety of wild flowers on the Reserve. No previous experience necessary!

June 30th. STEP MAINTENANCE: We will be giving the two sets of steps on the Reserve a 'service' to keep them safe for all visitors.

July 28th. 'POND DIPPING': The Reserve has some wonderful ponds that are full of life. We will carry out a survey to see what is lurking below the surface. This is done without getting into the pond!

August 25th. FENCING: The fences on the Reserve are there for visitor safety and to protect delicate habitat. We will do some maintenance work on them where necessary.

NOTE: This programme is provisional and may need to change due to weather conditions, etc.
