I am pleased to announce that since then the Cleanaway Pitsea Marshes Trust has agreed to fund the project because of its obvious benefit to both wildlife and visitors to the Reserve.



I have drawn a simple plan to show what will be done to complete the project (see next page). All of the works will be in accordance with recognised guidelines for access for less able visitors. The paths will be level and firm and will be constructed of material sympathetic to the character of the Reserve.

# **Badgers**

On 8 March 2000, The Noak Bridge Nature Reserve Society met at 7:30 in Kenilworth House for an enjoyable and entertaining talk and slide show on "Badgers". Mr Tony Doveston from Castlepoint Borough Council has worked extensively with Essex wildlife and badgers in particular for many years. He gave us a very lively and interesting insight into the life of these protected animals and we were surprised to learn that they are still hunted and used in the cruel sport of badger-baiting in certain parts of the country. They are social animals living in setts of varying sizes and like many other species of wildlife their habitats are disappearing, forcing them to live much nearer to populated areas. Mr Doveston's style was informal and friendly, encouraging members to participate in the discussions. It was a very successful evening, rounded off with light refreshments. We hope to invite Mr Doveston again in the future and we would like to see many more of our members coming to these fascinating talks.

## Wildlife

Where has our Spring sunshine gone? Still we did have two days of sunshine at the beginning of April, and as a result the following animals were found - 5 adders (4 female and 1 male), a large number of butterflies (small tortoiseshells, small and large whites, red admirals and peacocks), bumble bees, wasps and lizards. All were found near the ponds which are now very active — plenty of great crested newts etc. On May 13-14th, a cuckoo was heard, and during the month more butterflies emerged. We now have a wide variety of birds on the reserve, and a blackcap, a whitethroat and a sparrow-hawk have been seen.

#### The Constitution of

#### 1. NAME.

The name of the Society shall be the Noak Bridge Nature Reserve Society (hereinafter referred to as 'the Society')

#### 2. OBJECTS.

- (a) To participate with Basildon District Council in the management and conservation of Noak Bridge Nature Reserve.
- (b) To give information, advice and assistance to the officer appointed by Basildon District Council.
- (c) To encourage public interest and participation in the management and conservation of Noak Bridge Nature Reserve.
- (d) To promote public interest in Natural History and Conservation.

## 3. MEMBERSHIP.

Membership shall be open to all who share the interest and objects of the Society, as stated in Clause 2.

#### 4. MEETINGS.

The Society shall meet at least once in every year, which meeting shall be the Annual General Meeting and on such other occasions as shall be deemed necessary. The Annual General Meeting shall elect, by simple majority of all fully paid-up members present, a Chairman, a Secretary, a Treasurer and such other Officers as it may from time to time determine.

#### 5. GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The general management of the affairs of the Society shall be directed by a General Committee, which shall meet not less that four times a year and which shall consist of:-

- (a) A Chairman, who shall be the Chairman of the Society.
- (b) The remaining Honarary Officers of the Society
- (c) Six representatives of the individual members of the Society entitled to vote at meetings of the Society elected by and from among themselves at the Annual General Meeting.
- (d) Co-opted Members appointed by the General Committee who shall be members of the Society entitled to vote at meetings of the Society provided the total number co-opted members does not exceed one-third of the total membership of the General Committee as defined in (a), (b) and (c) above.
- (e) Advisory Members who shall not be entitled to vote at meetings of the Society General Committee.
- (f) At least one, but no more than three, representatives of Basildon District Council.

All members of the General Committee shall retire at the Annual General Meeting but shall be eligible for re-election. Any Officer shall serve for no longer than three consecutive years, after which he shall retire and shall be ineligible for re-election in that post for a period of one year.
