Annual General Meeting

The first AGM of the Noak Bridge Nature Reserve Society took place at Kenilworth Place, Noak Bridge, on the 21st June 2000. Members were welcomed by chairperson Betty Haynes, and thanks were given to everyone for their interest and support, especially Steve Prewer of Basildon Countryside Services, who had helped with the setting up of the Society. The steering committee was replaced by an elected committee (for details, see elsewhere in this newsletter) and a Constitution was adopted. Ranger Luke Bennett (representing Basildon Countryside Services) has helped the Society to acquire a £30,000 grant from the Cleanaway Trust to enhance the Reserve. The annual Statement of Accounts and Membership information were presented—the Society now has more than 170 members.

After formal business was completed an Open Forum was held, and plans for notice-boards, maps, information sheets and markers for the Reserve were discussed, together with other improvements being planned, including the provision of benches and easy-access facilities for the handicapped. After the meeting a nature quiz using slides and a variety of plant and animal specimens was conducted by Luke Bennett.

Norsey Wood Open Day

Sunday, 8 October dawned with a threat of rain but turned into a perfect autumn day. Representatives from our neighbouring reserves at Mill Meadows and Norsey Wood along with the RSPB and ourselves (Betty Haynes, Janet Bircham and Peter Hobbs) set up our booths on one side of the show arena.

The arena proved to be the centre of attention, with an almost continuous display of mediaeval hand-to-hand combat. The clash of swords and the thud of shields kept the constant stream of visitors enthralled. Various country crafts were the subjects of live exhibits with the daring tree trimming display using chain saws, carried out by the Anglia Tree Surgeons, being the highlight of the afternoon. Among the displays were bee-keeping, wood carving, twig brooms, willow basket making and garden plants. However, for the younger generation the steam traction engine proved to be a magnet for their attention and there were also craft projects for them to try. The most visited tent was probably the one with the refreshments! Hot food and drinks, crisps and confectionery were in continuous supply at very reasonable prices.

A great deal of interest was shown in our very own display. Our wonderful colour photographs (Betty's best!) attracted many visitors and once they were there they were captivated by the long-eared bat (deceased) which Betty tried to save after it was found on a Noak Bridge doorstep a few weeks ago. It is out firm expectation that our exhibits and information will bring new faces to our reserve and hopefully, new members for the Society.

RUSTIC BENCHES

The initial task in improving our Nature Reserve was the installation of the first of our benches, the Dereck Gould Memorial Bench sited at Pond No 1. The bench was constructed and set up by our own members with the help of our Ranger. Come along and enjoy the view, and you might even spot the kingfisher, as we did on the day.

BETTY'S SLOE GIN

½ kg sloes 1/3 kg sugar ½ litre cheap gin

Weigh the sloes then freeze until ready to use.

Your subscriptions are really important as they are our only regular source of income. We use the money for secretarial supplies and production of the Newsletter. Basildon Council Countryside Services have very supportive, but eventually we will have to do most of the administrative work ourselves. Our notice/display board for taking to exhibition, shows, etc. has to be replaced and we will shortly be producing a leaflet about our reserve for members and visitors. The leaflet will be used at shows and will be available in the reserve when the improvements have been completed.

From June 2001, all Memberships will be renewable on 1 June each year.

Project News:

If you have visited the Reserve lately you will have seen the great new benches that have been made and installed by members of the work party. They are made from chestnut wood, cut from Norsey Wood during the coppicing works. Two more benches will be added later.

The work party has also been renovating the two sets of steps and clearing back overhanging vegetation from along the paths.

The next stages of the project will be carried out throughout the autumn/winter and is programmed as follows:

- First, the pond will be cleared of silt and vegetation. This will be done by a contractor
 using an excavator.
- Then the route of the new path will be cut through the scrub.
- The path works will then be carried out, again by contractors, and will involve levelling of the ground and construction of the path.
- A 'drop kerb' and new barrier will be constructed at the main entrance.
- The boardwalk will be replaced with a new, more stable design.
- The final stage will be to install signs/ way markers to mark the new trails.

So, by the end of the winter the project should be completed and the reserve made more accessible to visitors in the Spring. The Work Party will be involved throughout the project, so if you would like to get involved - why not come along and join us?
